Help on the Way

Perhaps you've heard me rattle off the words, "Don't hesitate to ask for assistance—remember, it's just neighbors helping neighbors," and thought, "Easy for her to say!" But during the Great March Windstorm, I learned the truth: Asking for help is harder than I'd imagined.

Working part-time for North Fork Senior Connections, I field phone calls and emails from elders across the Valley who are seeking a bit of assistance, whether it's with transportation to appointments through our Neighborly Rides program, becoming more engaged in the community through activities, obtaining fresh fruit and vegetables through our CSA program and collaboration with UpRoot—or preparing their yard for the change in seasons. Just as our nonprofit began gearing up for our upcoming spring Service Saturday endeavor, where teams of volunteers help North Fork Valley elders get ready for summer, I was forced to seek aid—for me.

After caring for my sweetheart through the end of his 15-year battle with cancer, my dog and I moved back into our cottage on the east side of Paonia. The evening's forecast called for wind gusts over 50 mph, so I guess we shouldn't have been so startled by the great CRACK! outside the window. On a previous Sick Tree Day, experts had warned that the scraggly sub-alpine fir beside my cottage didn't look healthy; now the top twenty feet of it bisected my front yard, branches on the

ground not far from the roof corner. Soon after the rush of gratitude that it hadn't damaged my home, my heart sank: an arborist just wasn't in my budget.

Then I remembered a wonderful Hotchkiss volunteer with a chainsaw.

Making that phone call was truly difficult (even though I know men love their power tools) but I had to swallow foolish pride and punch in his number. That night I slept better knowing help was on the way. In the morning Chainsaw Man and his wife appeared with a truck and soon another generous volunteer from my neighborhood (who with *his* wife just expertly painted our office at the Paonia Senior Center) joined us, hauling branches out to the street. The trunk, cut into rounds, required another truck trip; what's left standing of the tree props up a honeysuckle bush. All that remained in the front yard was a line of sawdust and a few fir needles.

According to Pope Paul VI, "Nothing makes one feel so strong as a call for help." We all want to remain independent regardless of age, but sometimes we need the assistance of others. So if you're an elder with a yard that requires more attention than you can give at this time in your life, why not empower the volunteers at North Fork Senior Connections to spend 60-90 minutes at your place this spring? They can clean your gutters, get your flower beds ready for planting, install your swamp cooler—even wash the outside of your ground-floor windows. Service Saturday in Paonia will be April 27; in Hotchkiss and Crawford we're scheduled for May 4. Call or email us ASAP and a "scout" will visit to assess your needs. We want to help!
