CommUnity in Action

A On November 7th, a regular at the Paonia Senior Center mentioned how glad she was to live in "a purple community, where people help each other



no matter how they vote..." That started me thinking (more than usual) about what it means to be part of a community. Use of the word is as old as the 1400s, when it referred to "The body of people having common or equal rights or rank, as distinguished from the privileged classes." We have no king or aristocracy; in Paonia even the mayor pays that pesky sidewalk fee. But I want to focus on the "unity" part of the world. Some folks were born and bred here in the North Fork. Others of us emigrated from near and far, including places much more urban. But we share a landscape that we love: it's that simple. To me that makes us a comm-unity in spite of our differences. We're neighbors. We care about each other.

The recent Service Saturdays—October 26th in Hotchkiss and Crawford, November 2nd in Paonia—drove that realization home. Volunteers ranged in age from mid-eighties to eighteen months. (Okay, Elora didn't accomplish much in the way of work, but she brought a smile to every face.) Tasks ranged from cleaning gutters to harvesting herbs, washing windows to winterizing swamp coolers—and raking leaves: LOTS of leaves. The teams of volunteers visited 33 elder households across the North Fork. No money changed hands—instead the currency was generosity and gratitude, sweetened with home-baked cookies from both sides of the equation.

"I got all the kids (and their parents)," reported Rita Murphy. "The volunteers raked and bagged leaves and picked up locust pods—they were wonderful! One the moms even stopped by for a visit a couple of days later, and one of the dads came back and fixed my culvert."

North Fork Senior Connections started in Paonia, but this year we also focused on outreach to Hotchkiss and Crawford. Each community is unique, and its residents like it that way. But, if we're lucky, aging comes to us all. Especially during those later years, a small amount of help can make a big difference. Just the knowledge that someone cares can lift us up.




