Snapshots of Valley Volunteers: Angels in Disguise

Ever wondered what the North Fork would be like without its corps of volunteers? Important work would remain undone, and the arts would languish. I interviewed a few of the wonderful folks who keep NFSC on target with its mission to keep local elders thriving, engaged, and living independently in their homes for as long as possible. What motivates and inspires their kindness?

Now 79, one volunteer says it all began when he served in Vietnam and ended up 'adopting' a local family. "Being able to help somebody else really helped me over there." Now 79, he's an NFSC Snow Buddy, a stalwart Service Saturday volunteer, and seasonally delivers produce or soup.

When one retired nurse moved to Crawford she felt an immediate sense of community. She perceived that it was a "community of neighbors helping neighbors—and I wanted to be one of those neighbors." Now she's a stellar volunteer for NFSC as well as CAWS and serves as the communications coordinator for the Friends of the Crawford Library.

Early on in life, one Hotchkiss volunteer was instructed about money: "You will never have enough if that's what you care about." He and his wife help everyone they can, regardless of who they are. "It's all about giving to others..."

Another volunteer, who worked as a nurse for 45 years, says volunteering "feeds my workaholic addiction." Since moving to the Valley she's helped out at the Trading Post, KVNF, Blue Sage, Heirlooms for Hospice, Barkin' Bargains, and UpRoot; most Thursdays you'll find her washing the dishes after the catered lunch at the Paonia Senior Center.

One of our younger NFSC volunteers—only 56—wanted to get involved because he likes helping others, grinning as he explains, "It's more fun to work on someone else's property...Even if you don't agree about everything, they're still your neighbors."

When Nancy D first arrived in Paonia years ago, she observed that a lot of older folks needed help and made herself available to aid with packing, moving, cleaning, shopping, rides to appointments... Now nearing 80, she restricts herself to the less physical tasks (no window-washing!), but when her sisters came for a family visit, she convinced them to drive with her all over the hinterlands of Crawford, delivering CSA produce with a smile. Nancy says, "...What may seem a small thing to me might be a Very Big Thing for an elder person."

A common thread stitches these individuals together. Bonnie Q took a break from mopping the floor after a Thursday catered lunch to explain: "I really love helping people—it makes them feel good, and then I feel good!"
