It was a busy weekend for many, with graduations galore as well as our own yards to care for. Crawford garnered a few greatly-needed volunteers thanks to unstinting effort by NFSC Board member Wanda Gofforth, and those folks helped make a difference in the surroundings of a number of Crawford elders. In Paonia the week before, on May 10, 29 generous adults plus kids showed up ready to work, despite it being Mother's Day weekend and also the Sheepdog Trials in Hotchkiss.

But more assistance is needed. Our senior community continues to grow, yet our volunteer pool can't keep pace. One of the challenges of living in such a glorious Valley is that few adults want to move away, even though job opportunities are limited. As we age, the distance to shopping, medical care, and other important services looms larger. Yet who wants to trade peace & quiet and beautiful surroundings for the hubbub of city life? It's a conundrum we'd love to solve, but we can't do it without generous volunteers.
