## A Snowstorm in June: Stepping Back in Time

Claudia King will be 86 years old in September and plans to purchase another ski pass for Powderhorn. She lives independently, still gardens, and serves as a docent and board member for the Paonia Historical Museum. She recalls the old days in town:

"Now you listen to me, Willis Sutliff, and stay put! Don't you dare go past Robin Nest Hollow!"

"Ah, hesh up, you old bookworm!" Willis yells back, even though he's only six, and I'm three years older. "I can go as high as I want and you can't stop me!"

I sigh. He's right. Even though it's my job to run the lobby of the Cottonwood Hotel, assigning the guests—who are all kids in the neigh-

borhood—to the rooms we built on the sturdiest branches of the old cottonwood. I can't seem to keep Willis in line all the time. He wasn't much help building the platform for the lobby or the walls since he's no good with a hammer (unlike me) but he did go round to the neighbors, even the old lady with the mean German Shepherd Dog whose eyes turn red when he's going to attack, and Willis scrounged most of the discarded wood we needed for our big project. Daddy says we did a pretty good job of construction

and it oughta hold up for awhile, as long as we don't let big people like Bubbles Bross be guests.

Bubbles' family has its own hotel, anyway, a lot fancier than ours—they have ten rooms while we only have four, and ours mostly don't have roofs. The Bross Hotel is where grownups and their families stay if they come visitin' to Paonia, ridin' the passenger train all the way from

Delta. They even have entertainment at their hotel, since Libbie Atkins plays honkytonk piano. Some folks say Bubbles Bross drinks too much, but every time I cross his path on the way to pick up our mail at the post office he gives me a big piece of that new Bazooka Gum. We stand on the corner, both of us grinnin' and chewin', chewin and grinnin', and even though I blow the best pink bubbles I can he always blows his twice as big. Sometimes he tells me I have pretty yellow

> hair, which makes me go all shy. Boys are bad enough, but grown men? I'd rather hide in this tree. I like sittin' here in the Cottonwood Hotel, listening to the train conductor blow the whistle as it's hauling fruit my daddy picked to faraway markets. I remember when I was five and how we all jumped up and down and hugged each other that the War was over and they kept that whistle blowin' on and on...



The strong arms of this Onarga cottonwood are a great place to read. Willis is right about one thing—I am a bookworm. Our library, tucked in beside the Paradise Theater. isn't very big but I'll bet I've read every book in the place—at least the ones the nice librarian considers suitable for a young girl. Perhaps I'll be a librarian when I grow up. Or maybe a teacher. I just love my English teacher, who rode

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the narrow-gauge railroad from the university in Denver to Paonia, but then she got married so she lost her job, which doesn't seem fair. Could I be a librarian AND a teacher? And maybe even write a book? I'm going to college for sure. Even though I'm only nine I'm already saving up.

Mother's good at thinking of ways for me to make money. When I wove potholders out of those loops all the colors of a rainbow she bought the ones nobody else picked. Daddy's sister, who's one of those Fundamentalists, says my mother Irene is well-bred, like she's some kind of fancy Thoroughbred horse, and is an intellectual just because she doesn't say 'ain't.' I think Mother's really pretty and I like how she encourages me to have adventures-some of my friends come from families that preach fear of spiders and tramps and anything that could possibly be sinful, which is pretty much all the fun stuff. In the winter when the snow's good those kids don't even get to go sledding on McNutt's Hill. One of the bigger boys sledded all the way down and couldn't stop even when he got to the northbound train—we were scared he'd be lying there squished and bloody on the tracks when the train passed on but he sledded right between the sets of wheels under the baggage car and he didn't get hurt one bit. "Don't you be tryin' a stunt like that," Daddy said—and I told him I'm not that crazy....

I guess cottonwood trees are sort of like old folks. After many years their bark turns gray and gets deep furrows like the lines beside Mrs. Gillenwater's mouth. Cottonwoods don't last forever, I understand that. But while they're here they really live, tossing their cotton all over everybody's lawns like a snowstorm in June, spreading their seeds far and wide and standing up tall to wind and hail and blizzard. Someday I'll be one of those elders, and I'll be tough, too, and brave, regardless of what comes. You can count on it.
