I cared about our mission, believing it's crucial to keep our community's elders active and socially engaged, with volunteer help that can assist folks in staying in their homes as long as possible. The neighborly kindness of individuals in Paonia, Hotchkiss, and Crawford has truly been an inspiration: You know who you are, and words aren't enough to demonstrate my gratitude.

I had the good fortune to learn the ins-and-

outs of this job from the uber-generous Linda McCone, now in Costa Rica, then worked alongside the brilliance of Medeina Ryan.
